This year's return to school has been a year like no other and it has been a huge undertaking by management and staff to ensure our school was as safe as possible for students.

All classrooms have been fully cleared out and fitted with single desks to ensure as much space is available as possible

A one way system has been put in place to avoid any congestion in the corridors and signage has been placed around the school to help students with the new system.

The school has also purchased a number of picnic benches so students can sit outside and eat their lunch at the correct social distance.

Our canteen has moved into the main hall to allow for more space and breaks have been staggered to keep queues to a minimum.

Each room has also been fitted with an automatic sanitizer dispenser so students can keep their hands sanitized before and after each class.

Pictured are a mixture of first year girls enjoying the Halloween themed arrangement put together by students from Sr. May's class.




Leaving Cert Results

To play basketball at an international level is a remarkable achievement and we are all very proud of them.






Transition Year Muscial
